Road Watch - Adopt A Road - Clean Up Report June 2022 - June 2023

Thank you to those groups who have been able to report their litter findings. Whilst we know that many volunteers contribute more than the records show, the current available data calculates a total contribution of over 980 hours since July 2021. Activities take an average of 3.8 hours and collect an average of 3 bags worth of litter. That's a massive effort, thank you!

As you can see in the pie chart inset, the records for last financial year indicate that cans and bottles still make up the largest portion of litter collected. We hope that groups enjoy the benefits of collecting these valuable materials.

SAFETY SPOTLIGHT: Solo safety

A huge thank you to those individuals who have nominated to be the primary caretakers of a site. Whilst some alone time in nature being physically active can be very rewarding, we encourage you to always consider your safety.

Please ensure that you:

- Only complete activities on approved sites in safe weather to avoid safety risks.
- Notify another responsible person of your intentions, making sure you check in when your activities are complete.
- Notify KESAB of a secondary contact in case of an emergency.
- Always carry an operational mobile phone in case of an emergency.
- Always wear a fastened high visibility vest, appropriate attire and use your signage and equipment appropriately.
- Always complete activities in safe conditions. Rain, fog, low light and extreme temperatures are not safe for anyone so clean up activities are only permitted in safe conditions.
- Contact KESAB if you have any concerns. We are here to help you.
